Rising Junior Summer [10th-11th Grade]:

College Apps Advice for Juniors

It's time to start gathering your materials and information. Here is a worksheet to help you stay organized.

Collect your application materials.			
	Personal Information: Ensure accurate details for your name, contact information, date of birth, and family background. Collect the most recent parental tax information in preparation for your financial aid applications.		
	Educational Background: Request official high school transcripts early to avoid delays. Highlight any honors, AP courses, or special academic achievements.		
	Extracurricular Activities: Compile a list of school clubs, sports, volunteer work, and hobbies. Rank your activities list from most important to least important, according to your level of involvement and impact. Detail your roles, responsibilities, and any leadership positions held. Take time to revise and consolidate your activity descriptions. Use action verbs and short, fragmented language, similar to resume bullets, for brevity.		
	Standardized Test Scores: Decide whether to take the SAT, ACT, or both. Schedule and prepare for your chosen tests. Ensure your scores are sent to your selected colleges.		
	Personal Essays: Start brainstorming topics and drafting essays early. Be authentic and specific, and avoid generalities. Proofread and revise multiple times to ensure clarity and impact.		
	References/Recommendations: Confirm that your recommenders have submitted their letters by the required deadlines. Send thoughtful thank-you notes to recognize their effort and time on your behalf.
